From the President's Pen Captain Gregory Sacco (Ret.) 150

I hope that all is well with our readers. As summer finds its way here, the Museum is working on several new initiatives. We are striving to increase the number of our visitors and looking at ways to help us get more involved in the education of important local and national topics that coincide with our mission. Our Board of Directors, led by Board member Ed Martin and Director Kevin McDerby, has embarked on an ambitious project (Phase one) to change our signage to increase public awareness of our location.

One solution is to change our current wooden sign to one of the electronic signs that have become so popular in the retail and commercial venues. Electronic Message Centers (EMC), provide a multitude of advantages over the old methods. EMC's allow for very visible electronic messaging and allow that message to change to fit many needs. This effort opened the door to coordinate public safety needs that EMC's can fill.

As a part of this EMC project, the Board is looking to the EMC to fill several roles including public awareness and emergency announcements that could be broadcast to the public traveling by the Museum. We have been meeting with local and state agencies involved in public safety over the last several weeks discussing how this EMC can be used to provide meaningful traffic, safety and emergency information for the Dover area. When this project comes to fruition it can be the start of a state-wide emergency messaging system. What a fitting way to continue our public service function.

We have been working with potential state and local public safety partners looking for funding to assist in the cost of this project. Kent County Levy Court, in recognizing the importance of Emergency Messaging, has already awarded funding. We are working with some legislators for state assistance as well. More to follow as we near the end of the state legislative season.

Phase two of this project is the public awareness we hope to generate on a topic much in the news today. We are looking at adding an Opioid messaging and display

in the museum. As citizens visit our Museum, what an appropriate location to address this critical societal issue. This issue is in the news and is



impacting Delaware more than some realize. We hope to look at various methods of getting this information out to the public and increase their awareness, especially with our young visitors who can be so influenced by it. What a fitting way to add to the conversation on such an important subject.

In summary, with the use of additional campus pathway and highway signs, increased public awareness of our Museum, the potential to attract more visitors and finally an added focus on important public awareness and safety issues, we hope these efforts will be a springboard to enhance your next Museum visit.

Newark, State Police Now Have 2-Way Radio Tie-Up

Newark, Jan. 9 - Special - A two-way radio tie-up between

the Newark police and the Delaware State Police will go into effect within 60 days under a plan approved by town authorities yesterday. According to the new system, all local police calls will go by direct wire to the



nearest state police headquarters where the information will be relayed to the Newark patrol car.

Major advantage to the public will be the fact that the local patrolman on duty can then be reached promptly at any time of the day or night. Under the present system, calls go to the town office, which must notify the patrol car through street blinker lights or post phones. This makes it difficult to reach the patrolmen on duty quickly with emergency calls, especially at night.

The two-way radio will be installed in the local car within a month or two, it was said. Installation cost will be about \$475, yearly maintenance, \$125; and the monthly telephone bill for the direct wire, \$45. The state police service will be free. Another advantage to the new set-up will be the fact that the local force will be able to summon state police aid in an emergency and receive prompt support from state patrol cars.

Those State Police Pensions

On the Star's letter page this morning Senator E. Paul Burkholder, "majority leader," calls attention to the fact that the bill providing money to pay the pensions of retired members of the State Police did pass the Senate on April 2.

It will be remembered that the General Assembly finally adjourned at &:30 o'clock on the morning of April 5 after having been in session on its "last day" for 68 hours.

It may be some satisfaction to Senator Burkholder that his bill was passed by the Senate in the final unseemly scramble, when 150, or nearly half of the total product of 332 bills for the 60-day session were passed, but it will not be much satisfaction to the retired members of the police forces to reflect that their interests were neglected until the final throes of a pathetic travesty on law making.

The Legislature met on Janyary 7, with many protestations that it would and could give full care and attention to every measure proposed, and still adjourn with the 60-day Constitutional limit for its session. Strange indeed that Majority Leader Burkholder should have allowed such a vital measure to languish without protest until almost the last possible moment of the season.

There should be no hitch in the payment of the pension money for retired State Policemen, whose long, useful, and sometimes dangerous service entitles them to prompt payment in full, to which end the State is morally bound.


